Our Group is a Source of Information for a High Quality of Life. We urge you to call one of our group leaders BEFORE making any treatment decisions. We frequently learn that men who are newly diagnosed with PC are overwhelmed by the frightening magnitude of their condition. They opt for immediate resolution of their disease, which usually ends up with surgery, radiation, or other invasive treatment. Our experience tells us that PC is usually a slow growing disease which can often be controlled by other means. Hence, we advocate getting a second opinion, preferably from an Oncologist who specializes in PC. This is why we recommend talking to our members, most of whom have already been through the decisions you're confronting.

Lyle La Rosh spoke on Lupron, Casodex, Avodart and Femora. Lupron works on the pituitary gland and shuts off testosterone, some of the effects are:

1. Hot flashes
2. Loss of memory
3. Loss of muscle mass
4. Impotency
5. Long term use causes osteoporosis.

Casodex & multiple doses of 50-100-150, 150 gives a longer vacation. Some of the side effects are:

1. Loss of Libido

2. Gynodisplasia (Breasts)
3. Weight Gain like PMS
Avodart blocks testosterone from converting to dihydrotestosterone (food for cancer)

Avodart causes several things such as:

1. Hair loss—turns grey
2. Loss of libido

Femora is mostly used for PMS, it is an Estrogen inhibitor and reduces the side effects of Casodex & Avodart.

Dr. Filbeck and Goldstein both say that there is NO

connection between testosterone and Pca.

In 1941 a study was done on 7 patients and not one clinical study since then.

Gene Van Vleet talked about being a 5 1/2 year survivor since biopsy confirmed prostate cancer with a Gleason 7 and PSA of 5.7.

On Jan 2003 decided to have a Radical Prostatectomy and by Jan.2007 along with other fluctuations & challenges, PSA rose to 4.7.

We Have Great Speakers Ahead. Our May 17 speaker will be Dr. Mimi Guarneri, founder and medical director of Scripps Center for Integrative Medicine and has been an attending physician in cardiovascular disease at Scripps Clinic since 1995.

(Gene continued from page one) I Heard about IPCSG and attended my first meeting in Feb 2007, and here is what I am doing about treatment now. Based on recommendations of Lyle and Bill, I decided to make an appointment with Dr. Lam of Prostate Oncology Specialists in Marina Del Rey near LA. **there are no such specialists in San Diego.** I first sent an e-mail describing my history, and In one hour Dr. Lam's response was "I can help you". So I gathered complete records of my medical history in the last 10 years/ Went through the most extensive physical I have ever had including bone scans, CT scan, MRI's and Heart scan. My PSA has dropped to 0.9 since starting treatment on February 25th. My treatment is .5mg Avodart, 150 mg Casodex, 25 mg Femora to avoid breast enlargement/tenderness. Take charge of your treatment. Don't panic. You have time. Learn about options. Talk to members and find experts to help you make choices. The choices must be yours no one else's. It is your life----or death.

Above all maintain a positive attitude.

Get involved in our organization. Donate services as well as money. Become informed---take charge of your life.

Don Walker spoke about his experiences in dealing with advanced stages of the disease. He has been through Chemotherapy without effective results and is now undergoing radiation treatment (IGRT -- he is being treated by Dr. Mundt). The support and prayers of our group are with him.

We had a record 18 new comers at the last meeting. Welcome, we are happy you joined us.

SEPTEMBER IS PROSTATE CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

The IPCSG is involved in a number of different community projects which endeavor to make San Diegans aware of the importance of men getting tested for prostate cancer and if diagnosed to become aware of all

possible treatments.

Among these projects is our goal to place in every library in San Diego County, the film, "The Men's Club". This film which was produced here locally and with the help of this support group and a number of local doctors details ALL possible treatments including alternative and integrative methods for men and their families to discuss and choose. The 2 hour 18 minute film does not favor one treatment over another but gives a fair and independent revue of each treatment. "The Men's Club" has received favorable reviews from support groups nationwide.

PCA3 Molecular Urine Assay for Prostate Cancer in Men Undergoing Repeat Biopsy

Objectives

Men with elevated serum prostate-specific antigen (PSA) levels and negative prostate biopsy findings present a dilemma because of the lack of an accurate diagnostic test. We evaluated the potential utility of the investigational prostate cancer gene 3 (PCA3) urine assay to predict the repeat biopsy outcome.

Methods

Urine was collected after digital rectal examination (three strokes per lobe) from 233 men with serum PSA levels persistently 2.5 ng/mL or greater and at least one previous negative biopsy. The specimens were collected from April 2004 to January 2006. The PCA3 scores were determined using a highly sensitive quantitative assay with transcription-mediated amplification. The ability of the PCA3 score to predict the biopsy outcome was assessed and compared with the serum PSA levels.

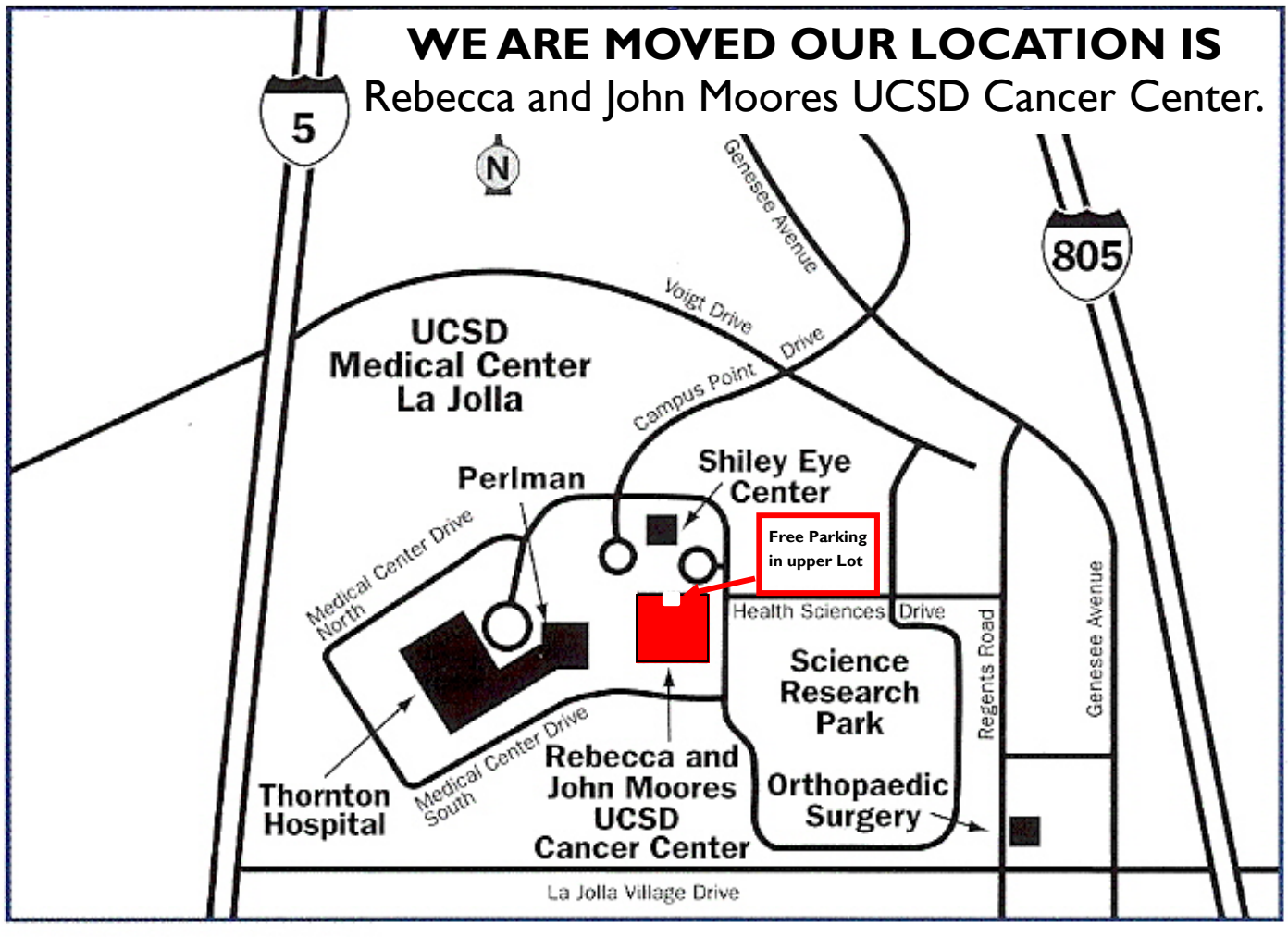
Results

The RNA yield was adequate for analysis in the urine samples from 226 of 233 men (i.e., the informative specimen rate was 97%). Repeat biopsy revealed prostate cancer in 60 (27%) of the of 226 remaining subjects. Receiver operating characteristic curve analysis yielded an area under the curve of 0.68 for the PCA3 score. In contrast, the area under the curve for serum PSA was 0.52. Using a PCA3 score cutoff of 35, the assay sensitivity was

58% and specificity 72%, with an odds ratio of 3.6. At PCA3 scores of less than 5, only 12% of men had prostate cancer on repeat biopsy; at PCA3 scores greater than 100, the risk of positive biopsy was 50%.

Conclusions

In men undergoing repeat prostate biopsy to rule out cancer, the urinary PCA3 score was superior to serum PSA determination for predicting the biopsy outcome. The high specificity and informative rate suggest that the PCA3 assay could have an important role in prostate cancer diagnosis.
